The Art of the Conquering Emperors



History celebrates the heroism and majesty (and wars, defeats and annihilations) of sovereign rulers of great power and rank. Often overlooked is the ability, because of their power, to encourage and promote cultural attributes in ways that ensured their lasting legacy through to today's world. Two "emperors" stand out in their efforts to do just that.

Charlemagne (771-814)



During his reign, **Charlemagne** consolidated most of Western Europe under his control, including modern-day France, Germany, much of Italy, and Northern Spain. He ruled a greater area of land than anyone had in Europe since the breakup of the Western Roman Empire; no one would again unite this much of Western Europe under one ruler until Napoleon about 1,000 years later. And he was one of the most powerful art patrons of the Middle Ages.

Charlemagne did much to encourage the revival of antique artistic styles and techniques. His art patronage connected him to the classical past of the Christian Roman Emperors through buildings, equestrian statues (a favored way of depicting military leaders), coins, metalwork, ivories, and illuminated manu-

scripts. His reign as Holy Roman Emperor resulted in a revival of art, learning, and literacy often called the Carolingian Renaissance, encouraging learning and artistic production throughout his court and empire.





Catherine the Great (1729-1796)

As a unique female Empress of Russia, **Catherine** was a significant patron of the arts during her reign. She expanded the collection of the Hermitage Museum in St. Petersburg, turning it into one of the most important art museums in the world. Passionate about European art and culture, she acquired works from artists such as Rembrandt, Rubens, and Raphael.

Under her patronage, Russian artists like Fyodor Rokotov and Dmitry Levitzky thrived, and she commissioned works from European artists, including the Danish portraitist Vigilius Eriksen. Catherine's efforts not only enriched the cultural heritage of Russia but also facilitated cultural exchange between

Russia and Western Europe. Perhaps the most popular painting in the Hermitage is *The Return of the Prodigal Son*, painted by **Rembrandt** from 1666 till 1669. Her patronage left a lasting legacy, with the Hermitage Museum remaining a testament to her dedication to the arts. Catherine's support helped elevate Russian art and integrated it into the broader European artistic tradition.



It's important to make sure that the legacies of those with the desire to rule include their contribution to our artistic heritage as well.

Dee Edwards May 2025 Artist of the Month

Dee Edwards has always been inspired by art and began drawing at a very early age. She is originally from Troy NY and moved to Arizona in 1979. Shortly after moving to Arizona she married her husband Rick, and had two sons, both of who inherited her love of art.

In 2012 she enrolled in a watercolor workshop at Shemer Art Center and Museum. This is where she discovered how vibrant watercolor can be and what depth there was in this medium. One of her favorite painters is Thomas Schaller, awardwinning artist and architect.



Because her husband works nights, she found this was the best time to paint while listening to music. She starts several paintings at a time, as one dries she works on the next one. She begins with a light undercoat and then builds layers from light to dark , adding techniques and details as she finalizes her painting. She says, "I'm never sure if it's going to come out or not. And then it surprises me when it does."

She loves to paint evening scenes with the moon, street lights, shadows, rain reflections, and urban sketching. Because she grew up in New York, she especially loves to paint as if she is looking into or out of windows.

She is a member of both Palo Verde Artists and Artists by the Lake, where she learned the basics of color theory, composition, brush strokes, layering, complementary colors and more. Recently, she won first and second place for two of her pictures in the Palo Verde Spring Art Show. Her advice to those that want to start painting is find out what you love and do it.
